VOLUNTEERS PRESERVING

MINNESOTA HISTORY FOR FIFTY YEARS!

n August 28, 1971 the first streetcar in seventeen years to run in Minneapolis for the public left the Como-Harriet Streetcar Line's platform at Lake Harriet and went south one-quarter mile to the museum's single-bay carbarn. Before that first run, a bottle of Lake Harriet water was broken across the front tow bar of TCRT No. 1300, with Judy Sandberg doing the honors. The crew on that first run for the public was Judy Sandberg and her husband Frank. After that brief ceremony, streetcar rides were offered to all passengers on that short round trip. The power supply was a towed trailer that had a trolley bus motor connected to a gasoline engine providing 300-volt current to No. 1300, the first Minnesota streetcar preserved by the museum.

n the ensuing years steady progress was made in extending the original Lake Harriet tracks, putting ▲-up the electric overhead to eliminate the need for the gas-generator "goat," rescuing and restoring additional historic Minnesota streetcars, and additions and improvements to the museum's buildings and infrastructure. All these advancements were documented in **Aaron Isaacs** column in the last issue of the *Streetcar Currents* and in the issues of the museum's then periodical, the *Minnegazette*.

 \mathcal{T} e celebrated fifty years of preservation on August 28, 2021 with a short ceremony at the Como-Harriet Streetcar Line's Linden Hills station. The principle reason why our museum has had success in making these improvements are our volunteers. Holding Board meetings, taking care of the finances, restoring and maintaining our historic streetcars, maintaining the track and overhead—all this is accomplished by volunteers. Over these fifty years, hundreds of volunteers have worked to preserve this small slice of Minnesota's history. Without our volunteers, past and present, nothing would get

done and the museum would fade into

O, let us celebrate the successes resulting from our volunteers. And let's look to the future when the current pandemic is hopefully in our rearview mirror and we can operate our streetcars and educate our passengers on the rich heritage of electric transit in the Twin Cities and Minnesota.

Ben will be posting them over the next several months. Once that is done, we'll start preparing issues of the *Twin City Lines* magazine from 2007 to 2019 and post them to our website.

Duluth No. 78 is back! Number 78 has been out of service since 2019 because it had a controller fire. Well, the 1893 single-trucker is back. Thanks to ESL shop Foreman **Howie Melco**, No. 78's damaged controller has been completely rebuilt, the other electrical wiring has been gone over, and the car is back in service.



This photo of venerable Duluth St Rwy No. 78 was taken on September 6, 2021. Built in 1893 by the LaClede Car Company of St. Louis, Missouri it was one of the first cars built after the Duluth horse car lines were electrified. It lasted in service until 1911 when it was moved to a West Duluth property and initially used as a garden shed. Acquired in 1971, No. 78 was the second car to be added to the museum's collection. Restoration began in 1983 and the car was completed and entered service on the Como-Harriet Streetcar Line in 1991. The car was moved to our museum's Excelsior Streetcar Line in 1999 to establish historic streetcar service there.

Ken Albrecht Memorial Gathering

A special memorial gathering was held on Monday, September 6th at the Excelsior Streetcar Line to honor the memory of **Ken Albrecht**, one of the most active and dedicated volunteers MSM has known. Ken was involved in almost all of the major projects that the museum undertook between 2000 and 2015. These included restoration of TCRT No. 1239, major exterior work on TCRT No. 1300 and building of the wood platforms at CHSL twice in ten years. Ken's major achievement was the complete restoration of Winona No. 10. All three cars were on display outside at the Excelsior carbarn. Inside the carbarn were other displays and a video presentation showing the projects in which Ken was involved.
